Founded in Antigua, Guatemala, in 2005, Casa Jackson Hospital for Malnourished Children is named for long-time GCP supporters Gene and Sue Jackson; they also inspired the founding of this program for malnourished boys and girls.

Immediately upon opening, regional demand for Casa Jackson's medical services quickly grew the program. Its positive reputation attracts medical and support volunteers, and dedicated donors, worldwide.

With a capacity for 60 in-patient children aged 0–18, Casa Jackson provides intensive medical and family care, and out-patient nutrition, medical care, and healthy-living education to families and communities.

Since 2005, Casa Jackson has medically recovered over 2,000 malnourished children, and saved countless more lives through out-patient and village-based work.

The GOD'S CHILD Project (GCP) is a 501(c)3 international humanitarian organization, managed as GCP, The Atkinson Center, and ITEMP.

Malnutrition in Guatemala, Central America

4th

Guatemala has the fourth-highest rate of chronic malnutrition in the world.

50%

Almost 50% of children under five are stunted and suffer from malnutrition aftereffects such as brain damage, xerosis, fatigue, emotional distress, and death.

65%

In rural and indigenous areas of Guatemala, 65% of the population is chronically malnourished.
